week schedule; a single rainy day is a significant interference in all services including those for residents' planting. An outside service

All this occurs as the regularity of plant and animal life, the interrelations of millions of years are undergoing significant change. Even February, the "beastly" month of Gilbert and Sullivan, this year had at least one day that could be celebrated for being "rare", i.e. "excellent"... the following deep frosts, less so.

#### FROM THE CRA PRESIDENT

As I wrote in my October article, many of us have been drawn to Crosslands because of the values expressed in the Kendal Corporation publication, *Values and Practices*. This publication is not just an old, tired document resting in the recesses of a dusty shelf. The values expressed are truly lived and significantly impact us every day.

In part, the first value listed is "... to foster a sense of **community**, treating each person as a valued individual in an atmosphere of mutual respect and caring." [my emphasis] This sense of community is so important to our quality of life and our happiness as individuals. Simply living in close proximity to each other does not make us a community. We are a community because we work together on a wide variety of tasks and projects—both big and small. We laugh together and mourn together. We share our interests and joys. We support each other through difficulties and sorrows. We share warm fellowship over meals. We have serious discussions about important topics. We do not always agree with each other and none of us is perfect, but our mutual respect and caring tie us all together in a vital and sustaining community.

I have a number of friends outside of Crosslands who say "I'm perfectly happy living alone in my own house!" They do not understand how much easier and happier their life could be if they were living in community as we do. My parents were a good example of this attitude. They had a comfortable house in a nice neighborhood, near the local university where they could attend lectures, concerts and other programs. After a while, their children moved far away and could only visit occasionally. Gradually, neighbors moved away and the new neighbors weren't interested in the older couple that lived next door. Gradually, their health declined. Gradually, their friends stopped coming to visit. Gradually, they stopped going out at night to programs at the university. Eventually, my father could no longer take care of my mother 24/7 and the only nursing home with an available place was 30 miles away. My parents managed, but life for them grew increasingly difficult and lonely. How different was their experience from my own. I am so grateful to be living here at Crosslands and thankful to all of you who

share your gifts to make life easier, interesting and sustaining in this community.

## Battle of the Brandywine Tues., May 23—8:30 a.m.

This will be an all-day trip using a 30 passenger tour bus to explore the territory where the Battle of Brandywine took place and learn about 18th Century life in southeastern Pennsylvania. Art Smith will lead us in following the movements of both the British and the Revolutionary armies on that day, the 11<sup>th</sup> of September, 1777.

Boarding our coach at 8:30 a.m., we will visit the Battlefield Park, watch a 20 minute orientation film and visit the museum and gift shop prior to going into the field. From there we will cross the Brandywine, tour the Barns-Brinton House, and make a stop at Kendal to visit the Old Kennett Meeting and have lunch.

Re-boarding the bus, we'll follow Howe's movements through beautiful Chester County, viewing the hill at Sconnelltown, where the British stopped to have tea, and Osborn Hill which gives us a scenic overlook of the battle area. The bus will be making stops at Birmingham Friends Meeting, Birmingham Hill, and Sandy Hollow. We will also tour the Brinton 1704 House. We should be home by 4:00 PM.

This tour of the Battlefield locale will enable all, new-to-the-area residents as well as locals, to visit places previously only driven past, to learn more of the history of the area, and to view Chester County's beautiful countryside, driving on roads only a few of us have travelled before.



Light 'n Lively has been mentioned on these pages recently; they need help to put on the shows that enliven a Saturday night each month with talented professional musicians.


