

A MORSEL FROM THE FOOD COMMITTEE

New research emphasizes that saturated fat is not only bad for our hearts but is also bad for our brains. We are all aware that it leads to arthrosclerosis of our

coronary arteries but we may not realize that the same disease process goes on in our cerebral arteries as well.

This common and damaging fat also deprives the brain of a protein, apolipoprotein or ApoE, that protects the brain from Alzheimer's Disease. ApoE searches for amyloid protein and carries it out of the brain. Loose beta amyloid forms the plaques and tangles that occur in Alzheimer's Disease.

So, it is smart to stay away from butter and fatty meats such as bacon and sausage. Whole milk which contains 4% fat and many processed foods like salami and many commercially baked cakes and cookies contain saturated fat.




