Hiking around Chester County

Summer is a great time to explore the many hiking trails and nature preserves in and around Crosslands. Dan Mitchell says all are welcome. If there is enough interest, he will lead the hike. Hikers can contact Dan at fdanielmitchell@gmail. com. The plan is to meet at 8:30 am at the Center and be back at Crosslands 11:30 or 12:00. He is available to hike on the following dates:

Always bring a water bottle, use tick repellent, wear comfortable hiking shoes, and carry a walking stick. In sum-

mer, it's always good to be near water and/ or protected from the hot sun, so Dan recommends hiking by the river, and following woodland trails. He recommends the following state parks and nature preserves:

The Laurels Brandywine Conservancy.

About 20-25 minutes away. Offers a lovely walk along Doe Run and Deer Run, tributaries of the Brandywine. Lots of trails to choose from with varying levels of difficulty, from level paths to rolling hills, and shaded lanes. Two covered bridges make this hike particularly interesting.

Brandywine State Park. About 25 minutes drive from Crosslands. A lovely shady walk along the Brandywine River in Delaware. There is a parking fee of \$7.00 for out of

White Clay Creek Also in Delaware, about a half hour drive from Crosslands through beautiful woodland countryside. The trail Dan recommends takes about an hour, and winds along a shaded path next to the White Clay Creek. This is an easy trail.

Longwood Gardens. This is moderate hike through meadows and woods, a little bit off the beaten track away from usual tourist garden walks. Takes about one to one and a half hours. There is an entrance fee.

Lukens German Band: "Singalong Special"






Where the Crawdads Sing (2022)




Mr. Deeds Goes to Town (1936)




Muscle Shoals (2013)


My Cousin Vinny (1992)

Various Thursdays 5:30-9:00 pm Downtown Kennett Square



Teaching & Learning Committee Hits the Ground Running

Inspired by academies of life-long learning (OLLI), George Helton and Ernie Novak thought, "We have the knowledge, skills, and interest right here at Crosslands. Why not do something similar and supplementary close to home?"

And so began the Teaching and Learning Committee at Crosslands (TLC). In January, Ernie and George, joined by new resident Fran Riddle, brought together residents interested in teaching and learning a variety of subjects. Based on this meeting and with approval from the CRA Board, they assembled a slate of classes for a spring semester, and close to fifty residents have enjoyed one or more classes.

Intrepid beginners picked up the ukulele under the guidance of Bob Frazier. Moon gazers learned from Loan-Anh Small basic Taoist principles of living in the moment. Ernie Novak introduced his students to the Roman Empire (togas were optional), and Nancy Connell sparked study and debate about contemporary issues in science.

Tiles hit tables for newcomers to Asian Mahjong taught by Jill Murray, and dancers celebrated cultural traditions from around the globe under the direction of Jenny Brown who brought her folk dancing class under the TLC umbrella.

The TLC plans to offer a broader array of classes in September. Space permitting, they will be open to all four KCC communities. The committee already has received requests for beginning Spanish, and new topics may include Islam, Genealogy, Public School Reform and more. Residents are encouraged to contact any of the co-chairs to express interest either in teaching or learning. Additional organizational volunteers are welcome for behind-the-scenes tasks such as scheduling, publicity, and crowd control.

The Brooke Worth Room: Renovated and Renamed the Nature Room

The rehabilitation of the 30-year-old Brooke-Worth Room is almost complete. The built-in bookshelves have been removed, the walls have been repainted, and a new carpet has been installed. This rehab effort will satisfy several needs — as a comfortable meeting space for small groups, particularly those of the three major committees concerned with the natural areas: Arboretum, Natural Areas, and Horticulture; as a center catering to residents' curiosities about the natural history of the Mid-Atlantic states; and as an introduction to opportunities for residents to make a difference in Crosslands' natural areas.

Library. To replace the built-in shelves, new bookcases will be added to house the reduced number of books which now focus on the Mid-Atlantic area, including additional books on trees and gardening. A donated computer linked to the main library system will allow residents to use their tags to check books out of this updated Nature Library.

Collections. Obsolete collections of shells and butterflies have been discarded, but the remaining collections of skulls and unusual objects found on the campus are in an illuminated cabinet in the corridor outside the door. A new collections policy has been drafted, and suggestions will be considered and decided by a consortium of the three outdoor committees.

Walls. A large screen monitor with Bluetooth connections will provide the Center a third room with projection capabilities. It will be mounted on the end wall. When not in use, it can display a continuous show of nature-related features which will be visible through the window from the corridor. Two workstations on the left side wall will provide space for work projects, and nature-related materials displayed on shelves above.

Record Storage. A lateral file will allow space for each outdoor committee to store meeting minutes, annual reports, and plans that can be accessed by any resident who may be interested in the activities of a particular outdoor

committee. Digitization of earlier records filed elsewhere is desired and will be pursued.

Currently, there are no plans to add any furniture to the right wall, but wall hangings are intended on both sides of the room. Representatives of each of the three outdoor committees have been invited to suggest photographs, maps, paintings, and other nature-related objects with inspirational and/or educational value.

These extensive improvements will provide residents with relevant materials, work project desks and a small group meeting space so that we can continue to champion Crosslands' cherished natural setting. In keeping with this goal, the room has been renamed The Nature Room.

Their locations are:

The six phones are easy to use. When you pick up the emergency phone, it will automatically dial the Firbank Central nurses' station. Nursing staff will answer the phone, take the message, notify maintenance, and take whatever steps are necessary to handle the emergency.

Conservation Plan: A Comprehensive,
Multi-Municipal Effort to Protect and
Enhance Bennett's Run

Presenter: Rob Daniels, Manager of Community Services, Brandywine Conservancy

Daniels forward Rob works to the mission of organization's protecting and conserving the land, water, natural, and cultural resources of the Brandywine-Christina watershed by working with municipalities on a variety of planning related projects, including comprehensive plans, open space plans, and trail feasibility studies. He is also responsible for overseeing the removal of the Hoffman's Mill Dam and the implementation of the High Trail, assisting in the feasibility and implementation of Green Stormwater Infrastructure (GSI) in areas of the Brandywine-Christina watershed, and leading the Conservancy's Reforestation Initiative by planting thousands of trees.

Rob is also a lead-member of the organizing team for Bike the Brandywine, an annual bike ride that supports the clean water programs of the Conservancy. Prior to his time with the Conservancy, Rob worked as a GSI Specialist for The Trustees in Massachusetts, the nation's oldest land trust, and the Kansas Forest Service. He holds both a bachelor's and master's degree in geography and lives in East Marlborough Township.



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Meet Lane Randall and James Salvas # 193

Jim Salvas and Lane Randall moved to Crosslands from West Chester, Pennsylvania, attracted by the Quaker values and Democratic Party politics. They got on the Ready List while the campus was shut down during the pandemic, so they were only able to see the living spaces on Zoom. In 2022, David Rhodes, whom they knew through common political activities, told them about a one-bedroom cottage with den that was going to be available. They were able to visit the cottage, liked it, and decided the time had come to move.

Lane was a competitive springboard diver from age eleven until she was twenty-three. After taking a course in computer programing at Montgomery County Community College, she became fascinated with the new technology and has worked with computers since 1969, starting with those enormous IBM 360 Model 50 mainframes. In those early days, computers were programmed by wires and punch cards. Using IBM instruction manuals, Lane moved from fig-

uring out wires to more sophisticated programs and systems analysis.

Jim dropped out of Syracuse University after his third year and joined the military, assigned to an aerial observation unit of the 1st Air Cavarly Division

operating surveillance equipment from helicopters and airplanes in Vietnam. This experience was where he developed his skills with the camera which has become a life-long vocation. After the Army, he returned to complete his degree at Syracuse.

Jim and Lane met when he was Director of Advertising Research at Chilton C., a division of ABS/Disney, and Lane was a systems analyst. They worked together on a remote data system for research data, two years before the invention of the internet. They celebrated the success of their project in 1981, and became a couple, but didn't get married until 2015. Lane wanted an independent life, and, having read *A Woman of Independent Means*

when she was in her 30's, she was determined to keep control of her life, particularly in a field where women were not generally accepted.

Eventually, Jim and Lane started their own company, Sigma-2 Associates Inc., a market research company which specialized in editorial and advertising research for magazines and other publications. They operated Sigma-2

for 25 years, with clients ranging from Hearst Magazines to *Prevention* and *The Atlantic*.

When they weren't working, Jim and Lane enjoyed traveling and set out on road trips, usually with a theme in mind and Jim's photographs to highlight their travels. A particularly successful theme was a Music City Road Trip, which took them to Natchez, Nashville, Memphis, New Orleans, and St. Louis. They went to Graceland, and Ryman Auditorium, home of the Grand Ole Opry.

In 2009, they took a 10,426-mile road trip setting out on a northern route through Canada, and then south through San Francisco, and Yosemite Park, before heading back a southern route, through Arizona and New Mexico, to Washington DC. They spent 42 days on the road writing a blog, called "Jim & Lane's Road Trip 2009," posting each leg of the journey with photographs to commemorate their favorite sights, and adventures.

Now settled in at Crosslands, and after Lane has recovered from her hip operation, what next? Jim says he would like to go to Italy to follow up on genealogical finds about his grandparents.


