- 5. Report of last KRA meeting:
 - Joan Applegate September Presented due to Covid and Zoom. KRA meeting was held on Zoom. Discussion about Values Booklet. Pres-Elect report included reports by four committees. There was an appeal for articles for their newsletter. Standing committee reports given.
 - Renee Overholser October Renee was very complimentary about the redecoration of Kendal Community Center. - 9. President's Remarks David Camp: David was thinking about Calvin Pickel and a pamphlet "Let Your Lives Speak": which seemed to be a personification of Calvin and how he lived. A reminder that the Employee Appreciation Fund is going on right now. Diane Hulse added that there is information in the Welcome Manual that might help residents wondering how much to give.

- 12. New Business:
 - Joan Applegate with a proposal from the Welcoming Committee: An
 initiative to work with new residents to have dinner and share information
 about the CRA 2 board members and four residents.
 - Arboretum Team -Rob Shipman: Updating new and old residents about the arboretum. 2400 trees. Inventory will be updated this fall. With inventory comes a medallion. The number on the medallion refers to the Kendal Crossland Arboretum inventory list. There is a searchable data base. Data base was created by Kay Edstene and she continues to maintain it. More than 60 residents have adopted trees on the loop walks. This is not a CRA committee. It is a free-standing activity. Gifts of \$500 allow you to adopt a tree. Map in the Nature Room shows the trees. Question from Isabel Olmsted: In the past, the trees had their name but now there is a number" Answer: 240 trees have the name on the brass tag.

13. Residents' Remarks:

- Allen Prindle; discussion last month about energy audit. Has there been any update? Admin will address.
- Carol Ann Baker: Praise of "tree huggers" and everyone who has done so much to keep our environment so lovely.
- Betsy Cullen: Could we get a range of what we should be giving for the Employee Recognition? Again, it is in the Welcome Manual. Diana Stevens said the range changes from year to year. She will have up to update information on the website. Anne Gross suggested that the average seems to be \$300 but Diana said it changes and she will update.
- Thomas Swain: Newspapers were delivered but it was cut off. Now piles of newspapers are being delivered to different areas of the community and if they are not picked up, they are discarded. New elevated walkway near parking lot 7 may be dangerous and might need a fence.

14. Remarks by CEO and Staff:

- <u>Seth Beaver</u> Mentioned that Calvin Pickel was the guy who knew where everything was. Lisa and Michelle are in Chicago, so Seth was presenting in their place. Construction: New roadway and lighting from entrance to the Woolman building. New committee: Spray Field, Kendal Health Center will start in February. Interviewing for project manager now. Construction on Kendal Café is going well on budget. Brown Pelican turned out to be an original Audubon print. It is valuable but some feel it is ugly.
- Roy Manno: Brinton building had a slab leak, a pretty significant issue. A little bit of flooding in some apartments. The emergency plumbers are working on it. Energy audit three different firms are assessing whether they want to do the audit. Community and health centers will be the first round and then there will be a plan going forward. Safety Nov. 16,11-12 in WPR a Safety Forum Dialogue going on at both campuses for residents and staff. That afternoon same company will present to residents at Kendal. Parking Please do not park in spaces for ambulances or in front of fire hydrants, or fire lanes, loading dock or spaces reserved for medical personnel or vehicles. Handicapped spots only if you have hang tag or license. Anne Gross had a question for Roy about the Fire Closet near her cottage being locked. She requested that the slow down sign be put on the road on the other side of the pond.
- Quiana Pettiford: Hiring Event being held for environmental services and health services. DEIV manager position – over 50 applications have been prescreened and 3-4 will be brought back for more.
- Ed Plasha-13 open units, 2 unsold, Kendal has 9 open units, all spoken for. Also had kind things to say about Calvin Pickel. KCC is now totally disaffiliated with the Kendal Corporation. We are now completely solo. Use new email addresses. Old emails will work for a year. Thanks to everyone who came to the Worth Open House. Dave Shipman will be approved at the next meeting. Budget will be presented. Good news expected.

- Donna Taylor: Successful COVID booster clinic, still have cases of COVID. People are recovering and doing well, some cases in the health center but everyone is doing well. Received word that Barclay Friends will be finding another PT service and no longer use KCC. Pharmacy very challenging month. Decision to close pharmacy 4-6 months ago. CPS had been good but change of ownership and it has not been good. Multiple conversations with Polaris COO and CEO are aware of mistakes and delivery problems. An action plan is in place, RNS on site to help with things that have gone wrong. Donna apologized. Looking at new options. Clearly Polaris was not prepared for the volume. It has impacted Resident Care.
- Cathy Emig: also mentioned working with Calvin and caring for him in Firbank. Still seeing COVID every day in all levels of care. All leadership meeting regularly to solve problems and move forward. (Bea) Identifying additional support to complete a review and analysis of operations. Making best efforts to work through the challenges.
- Questons from Residents for Administration: Betty Nathan question: is it possible to keep resident care open during the lunch hour? Answer: Under the scope of Beatriz in how best to operate the department. That department hasn't run normally for four years. Ted Farraday said that the loss of Bea would be a significant loss. High praise for Bea and hopes she will continue to be here. Renny Wood commented on the fact that resident care needs another nurse and a pharmacist. Answer: a nurse is there daily and a liaison from pharmacy. Recognize that we need more staff, and they are working to ensure care here. Leslie Gifford: Is it possible to get the covid dashboard back. Donna answered, that could be done. Brigitte Alexander: needed help and resident care was overwhelmed and not able to help her. Answer: pharmacy problems are taking 80% of time right now. Use emergency button if there is an urgent need. David Rhoads: delighted to see they are working on plan B. What kind of timeline is there in place? Donna: hoping to be done by the end of the month. Must have back up plan. Need a pharmacy. Hoping to fix with existing pharmacy partner but looking at other options. Julie deWolff mentioned using mail order pharmacy or CVS. Also, she was disappointed that there was no information about open enrollment Medicare options. Donna acknowledged that it would be a good idea.

MEMO TO CRATREASURER – RE SPECIAL ALLOTMENT OF FUNDS TO PAY FOR PERENNIAL PLANT SIGNS IN THE NATIVE PLANT PRESERVE (NPP)

Final draft - Aug 1 2023

Background

Under the auspices of what was then known as the Crosslands Nature Conservancy, 18 years ago the NPP was first developed by a group of residents headed by resident Dot Plyler. Over a 15-year period, this group of residents purchased and then installed 37 shrubs and 169 perennials in a 50'x 50' fenced area on the edge of the woods now occupied by the Mott Cottages.

In 2020, 32 shrubs and a few perennials were moved and replanted in a fenced partially shaded wooded area along the southern end of the Cross Trail that was initially cleared and is now maintained by a group of 7 Crosslands residents. As was the case in the original location, the botanical and common names of each shrub are identified and easily read on a 2" x 4" sign anchored by a stake.

Current situation

Although Grounds staff assist when needed, (Casey Groff's budget did contribute to the one-time addition of perennial plants last year), ongoing care of the NPP and plant purchases continue to be the primary responsibility of residents.

In the past year, more than 65 perennial plants were added to create a new herbaceous layer of native plants. For the benefit of interested residents, the location of these plants will soon be identified on a map and hopefully by signs in the ground.

A Special Request

\$1,500 is requested as a one-time addition to the FY 2024 budget for the Crosslands Natural Areas Committee (NAC) to purchase plant signs for the 100 new herbaceous plants. Such a one-time allotment will allow 100 herbaceous plants to be identified on the ground by a 2" x 4" metal plant sign on a 10" metal stake @ \$15 each.

Such an addition to the NAC budget will allow continuation of a practice initiated by Dot Plyler 18 years ago which will bring both knowledge and pleasure to current and future residents for many years to come.
